
**Donald E. Pienkos**, University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee Professor Emeritus (Political Science), chaired its Polish Studies Committee.

Fryderyk Chopin (1810-1849) was born in Zelazowa Wola, near Warsaw in the wake of the third partitioning of Poland and in the midst of a new struggle for national rebirth in the time of Napoleon of France. Despite his fragile health, Chopin, an outstanding pianist, composed a massive number of mazurkas, polonaises, nocturnes, etudes, waltzes, preludes, impromptus, and a sonata that are widely performed to this day.

On Chopin's place in world music, Karol Szymanowski, his countryman and fellow composer, wrote in 1923: "The Polish character of Chopin's work is unquestionable, not because he also wrote polonaises and mazurkas ... as a Pole he reflected the very essence of the tragic break in the history of the people and instinctively aspired to give the deepest expression of his nation ... For he understood that he could invest his music with the most enduring and truly Polish qualities only by liberating art from the confines of dramatic and historic content ... This attitude was the reason why Chopin's works have come to be understood everywhere...Therein lies the strange riddle of his eternal vigour."
